





THE FIRST FIFTY

When the Stonehouse Male Voice Choir held its first concert after the war, Bob Chalmers, our founder conductor, quoted these words in the programme:—

'The man that hath no music in himself, nor is not moved by concord of sweet sounds, is fit for treasons, stratogems and spoils.'

(Merchant of Venice, Act V, Scene 1)

Over the fifty years since its formation, with the exception of the war years, the choir has provided an opportunity for men in the area to meet together with a common interest, a love of music. We were fortunate in the beginning having a conductor with the enthusiasm and musical knowledge of Bob Chalmers. Those of us who were fortunate to be members of the choir during Bob's leadership owe much to him.

Another conductor who will be fondly remembered was Jack Hamilton, also a local man, who had been associated with choral singing for most of his life and who, like Bob, demanded of us the highest standard of which we were capable.

For the first time, a member of the choir became conductor. John Lawrie had been sub-conductor for some time while a valued member of the bass section and once again we were fortunate in our choice. John has a deep and sincere love of music and the choir benefited greatly from his leadership, not only as a conductor, but also as an arranger for male voices of some of the 'pop' songs of yesteryear. It was with sadness that we learned that John had tendered his resignation but we fully understood his reasons. As a senior member of staff in a school in Shotts his responsibilities became increasingly more onerous and he reluctantly decided that his out of school activities would have to be curtailed. The decision which he made said much for his loyalty and sense of responsibility. A number of years before he became our conductor, John had founded what was to become a very fine ladies' choir in his home village of Glassford and he decided that he would continue to lead them. Our loss was their gain and we wish John, his wife Janette and the Glassford singers well.

One door closes and another opens, so it was with us. As with most villages, news travels fast and we soon learned that a gentleman was now living in Stonehouse who had been a member of the renowned Glasgow Orpheus Choir and is a founder member

Murdoch McLean was approached and of the Phoenix Choir. asked to accept the position of conductor and it was with some hesitancy that he accepted. He made no secret of the fact that he had no conducting experience but members of the choir felt someone with his knowledge of choral singing would have much to offer. Murdo has been in choirs since he was eleven years of age and since the Phoenix started he has served it at various times as Choir Secretary, General Secretary, President, Soloist and Interim Conductor. We in Stonehouse like to think that it was his experience with us which made it possible for him to be Interim Conductor with the Phoenix. Our confidence that Murdo McLean would have much to offer our choir was well founded. His vast experience and his ability to interpret the words and music has added to the pleasure we derive from choral singing and we hope, to your appreciation.

Each conductor in these fifty years has added something to the choir and so too have our accompanists. From May (McNiven) Kirkland, now living in New Zealand, Barbara Mather at present in a nursing home in the Isle of Skye, Janette Laurie who, with her husband John, is very actively involved in the Glassford Ladies' Choir, to our present pianist Cathie Hamilton, all have contributed in no small measure to the continuing existence of Stonehouse Male Voice Choir. Our sincere thanks to all of them for many fond and happy memories.

Members of the choir who have sung solos at our various concerts are too numerous to mention but two of them will always be remembered by those who were priviledged to hear them, namely Willie Whitelaw and Frank Johnston. Audiences everywhere responded to their singing, each was a fine soloist and the wit and humour when they joined in duet were particularly well received.

This year will be the 33rd Annual Festival of Male Voice Choirs and again we will take part as we have done in many previous years.

In closing, a quotation from our programme of 30 years ago.

And night shall be filled with music, And the cares that infest the day Shall fold their tents like Arabs And as silently steal away.




