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



Beethoven, a genius in his time, had a string of chart toppers in the early 19th century and regularly played to packed audiences around Europe. He hopes to rekindle those memories by playing at a Rave in Strathclyde Park in the Summer.





Think about Drink




The same attitude problem seems to be of litter. Nowadays many youths discard litter without a thought or care whereas in the past

Protecting the Children from Tobacco

Tobacco companies continue to thrive demonstrating their advertising success, profit and growth regardless of their customer's health. Look at inbuilt faults in the system which allows cigarette advertising to be very effective in the young, and encourages them to take up this lethal habit.



The law currently requires that children under 16 years of age should not be sold cigarette and yet 9-10 year old youngsters can easily buy single cigarettes at 20p each.

This is plainly not for their parents use and the retailer's greed makes in excess of £2.00 profit per pack sold in this way. Police state they are unable to do anything unless a member of the public makes a specific complaint stating, where, when, who, etc.

This "blind eye" in the system in effect encourages children to take up smoking early, and specialists accept and recognise that the more cigarettes smoked, the greater the risk of serious illness, pain and death.

Scotland, in common with Northern Ireland, has the highest incidence of heart disease and lung cancer in the world. Smoking is heavily implicated with these preventable illnesses and yet there is no compulsory health education in our Scottish schools and our police appear helpless in the face of retail greed and the recession.

Each year in the UK 120, 000 people die from smoking related illnesses, many losing 20-30 good quality years and yet children can be seen smoking openly in the streets around our schools. These youngsters will form the disease statistics of the future. The community is failing to learn and is repeating the same mistakes by believing the fashionable, good life myth promoted by tobacco sponsorship and advertising.

Many now think that not only should tobacco advertising be banned but the safety rules applied to pharmaceutical drugs should also apply to tobacco smoke. Both are drugs except one group assists recovery and the other causes disease.

Stop smoking now and discourage the young from starting.

The Clyde and Avon Valleys Project

The Clyde and Avon Valleys Project is promoted by the District Councils of Clydesdale, Hamilton and Motherwell and the Strathclyde Regional Council in partnership with the Countryside Commission for Scotland, Nature Conservancy Council for Scotland and the Lanarkshire Development Agency to promote a wide range of improvements in the Clyde and Avon Valleys.

The 64 square km Project area stretches from the A723 Motherwell-Hamilton road 24km up the Clyde Valley to, and including, the Falls of Clyde, and 14km up the Avon Valley to Stonehouse.

The major aims of the Project cover six main headings: - Recreational Development - Landscape Improvement - Habitat and Wildlife Protection - Education and Community Involvement - Planning and Development - Job Creation and Business Links

It is intended to involve local communities, organisations and individuals in promoting the aims of the Project and to encourage environmental awareness and understanding. Specifically within the context of LEEF, the Project is keen to actively promote environmental education through establishing links with schools and colleges.

The Project area is already home to some of Lanarkshires major environmental education resources, including Chatelherault Country Park, Baron's Haugh RSPB Reserve, New Lanark World Heritage Village, and the Falls of Clyde SWT Reserve. The quality of the

environment within the Project area, in terms of landscape, heritage and wildlife, offers much more potential for environmental education. It is hoped to develop wider opportunities for environmental education throughout this area and the Project Manager is keen to make contact with schools and colleges that have an interest in the Project.


Despite a personal promise by himself at a meeting previous, and concrete proof that the traffic (which has doubled since 1979) is damaging housing and causing stress to the occupants we are still awaiting the go ahead.

As part of the campaign to put pressure on those concerned, a questionnaire will be delivered to every house on the main street which we hope will be filled in and returned. This will inform us of the structural damage to each house in order that each household may put a claim forward for compensation for damage caused by traffic. This questionnaire is to everyone's benefit and can only further the case put forward to give Stonehouse a chance to breath again.

The Spectacle E'e

An often forgotten about run of waterfalls which to this day retains their beauty they have possessed since the beginning of time itself. The Spectacle E'e falls remain one of Scotlands most spectacular sights yet so few know of or have seen their magnificent cascading torrents which flow over a 40ft drop into the Kype.

The walk which has recently been restored by the National Trust begins from Sandford village, and continues along the river Kype to a series of three falls. The most spectacular of them all can be seen up close from a small wooden walkway which overhangs the river.


The trail is especially at its most beautiful in the Autumn. Remains of a castle can be seen along the walk. Following the banks of the

river Kype you eventually meet with the river Avon.

The falls lie within the parish of Stonehouse. Never has such a splendid sight been so unknown but perhaps its better to leave it that way, as one of the few unspoiled parts of wilderness in Lanarkshire.

Opencast Mining -A blot on our landscape

For those who don't know what the horrendous view over the river Avon is, we can inform you that this is the result of Opencast mining. Despite the Community Councils objections the approval of the site went ahead. This process of removing the coal shall take 2-3 years and apart from being an obvious eyesore this is not the concern of the Community Council.



The concern is with the environmental consequences linked with the mining. The problem is that tons of waste (sludge) have to be drained out the ground into large storage tanks, and the worry being that not all the waste is being collected properly.

As you know the Opencast mine lies on the banks of the river Avon and thus there could be serious damage caused to the surrounding environment. By the sludge filtering into the river it could be detroying many species of fish and especially many rare flowers which are only to be found in this part of Scotland. The devastation caused could be irreversable to the environment.

The only protection we have against this catastrophe is the Clyde River Purification Board who keep an eye on the drainage process. All we can do is hope that the waste created by the mining does not pollute our waters or we may be seeing the last of our wildlife and rare species we have possessed and viewed through the years.

Diabetic Assistance for Stonehouse Hospital

In 1988 at a Diabetic Clinic Dr. David Matthews said he was hoping to have a club for patients and relatives of Diabetics at the hospital. This was discussed many times but it was not until cash was raised that this project finally started to take form.

D.A.S.H. was formed in September 1989 with a few interested parties attending the meetings. Since then we have purchased equipment and helped patients have a holiday and attend Diabetic conferences.

We decided that due to the lack of accommodation we would try to raise funds for a Diabetic Education Suite. This has now been accomplished; and it is due to the generosity of many local residents, friends from afar, drug companies and interested parties. Stonehouse Hospital, Hamilton and East Kilbride Health Board have been very supportive in this venture. Henry Boot Inner City Scotland Ltd were given the contract to build from the start to the finish in only 10 weeks. The suite was handed over to the Health Board in July this year. In January we hope to have the suite officially opened by a celebrity. I take this opportunity to thank everyone who has given time, monies and help in any way towards this great venture. I would also like to thank the Hamilton Advertiser for all the publicity given in the past and also to the Stonehouse Lantern for this publication. We are now saving for a special chair for the Chiropodist. We held our annual

Supper Dance in the Larkhall Leisure Centre and raised about £600.


On a more serious note: If anyone wishes help about Diabetes in the family and how to cope I am available, with the consent of the committee, to help and advise.


Whers oor Sportsbarn?


The Witches of Stonehouse


Near three centuries ago a practising cu-

that the reason Roman roads were so straight was that the Romans believed that devils or demons would be waiting round corners and thus built roads straight to avoid such an encounter.




The Roman Road Stonehouse



STONEHOUSE'S BAND IN DEMAND

SIOUX NATION

In July of last year three boys from Stonehouse who were in London at the time decided to get a band together. At first it started out as a four man band but since it has risen to a five man band.

The band thinks they get their roots from Led Zeppelin, The Cult and The Sisters of Mercy, plus some of their own stuff mixed in with it. The band is called "Sioux Nation" and the name came about when George (one of the guitarists) saw the name in a book he was reading.

The bands decisions are made by George basically but all the band has a say in the matter. George writes most of the songs and lyrics but again the rest of the band gets to put their own ideas to the songs.

When I asked band members Dusty and Mark for an interview I asked them what tracks of theirs they like playing the most. Dusty's favourite tracks are "Soul Stealer, Temple of the Low men, Sweet Angel and Wolf Child". He also likes their own version of Born to be Wild by Steppen Wolf and Moby Dick by Led Zeppelin.

Mark's favourites are "Soul Stealer and their two new songs Spirit Horse and Home which they wrote in the studio on Saturday 30th of November and will hopefully be doing a demo in a couple of weeks.

Although the band gets on O.K. as Dusty puts it, they can have a good slagging match at times and John Douglas the vocalist, usually comes out the worst most of the time, but Stuart McCluggage can also get a good slagging as well.

Dusty who started playing the drums who like the liked Adam and the ants. Mark

started paying the bass about four years ago because he says "It was something to do!" Their ambition in life is to be able to give up their jobs and be able to live comfortably.

As I said earlier the band contains five members, who are as follows:- John Douglas - Vocals, Mark McNeil - Bass Guitar, George Christe - Guitars, Dusty on Drums and the newest member on guitar Stuart McCluggage.

I also asked them what their favourite bands were. Dusty's are Bauhaus, Love and rockets, Fields of the Nephlim, Led Zeppelin,

The Cult, The Doors and Jimi Hendrix. Marks favourites are The Sisters of

Mercy, Fields of the Nephlim, The Remones, Skid Row, Neds atomic Dustbin and Hanoi Rocks.

The band haven't any gigs lined up at the moment but are concentrating on staying in the studio's and writing new material which should be as good as or even better than the songs they have already written and played at numerous gigs such as a rock Festival at Carluke which they were fa-

vourites to win. They went straight to the top but mysteriously dropped to third place by the end of the festival. They also played at Motherwell where they were the top band from ten bands appearing.

The band are getting T-Shirts printed which are designed by John the vocalist.

So if you are into Rock music, look out for this band playing locally and go and see them. I have seen them and thoroughly enjoyed them and have been at every gig they have played. For me this band get a rating of twenty out of ten.


A flash from the past


Right. A Stonehouse hand-loom weaver still plying his trade in 1935 when the market was on a sharp decline.

Up to the end of the 18th century there was still a living being made at the weaving, and weaver's cottages were still being built in the 1880's, e.g. Hill Road, Stonehouse. After the turn of the century, however, very few people took up the trade and after the first World War only the older men worked on.

The last two weavers in Lanarkshire, as far as is known, were two brothers, Robert and James Hamilton of Camnethan Street, Stonehouse, who stopped work in 1939.

Below. The silk loom illustated here belonged to the Hamilton brothers, which is now in the Royal Scottish Museum, Edinburgh. James Hamilton who died in 1959 set the loom up himself. The loom was known as a Jacquard Silk Handloom.
